

Tractor Trailer Driver Qualifications

Must have prior experience operating over-the-road type diesel tractor while transporting materials or heavy equipment on a lowboy trailer. Must possess and maintain a valid Class "A" Tennessee (or equivalent out-of state) Commercial **Driver License and comply with Federal Department of Transportation (DOT) Alcohol and** Drug testing rules as a condition of continued employment. May be required to successfully complete a battery of skill tests as deemed appropriate by Human Resources to evaluate competencies in operating related equipment.
